
PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The monthly appearance of speakers from the professional meteorological community, many of whom work in the same halls and rooms as the students within the Weather Center, has been a consistent highlight of OUSCAN's offerings. Prior speakers have included individuals in specialties ranging from the Oklahoma City broadcast market, to a lifelong career as a forecaster in NOAA's National Weather Service. Occasionally guest speakers will host interactive, colloquium style workshops, giving members the opportunity to walk in the shoes of a forecaster in a high-pressure situation, such as a severe weather outbreak. Members have the opportunity to ask questions about cutting edge topics that pique their interest, gain insight from top-tier professionals working in meteorology and related fields, and develop important connections to further their prospects for professional development.





COMMUNITY OUTREACH & THE WEATHER FRIENDS


Just as OU SCAN provides wealth of opportunity to it's members, those involved feel a calling to use their passion to give back to the community. The Weather Friends, a team of weather-themed superheroes, often visits elementary schools in the Oklahoma City Metro area spreading awareness about severe weather, and teaching children how to stay safe when it strikes. In addition to appearing at local elementary schools, the Weather Friends also participate in the annual National Weather Festival, giving out their signature trading cards and reuniting with some of the elementary schoolers they had presented to over the course of the year.

SOCIAL EVENTS FOR FACULTY, STAFF & STUDENTS

In addition to providing opportunities for academic and professional development, OUSCAN also encourages bonding and unity within the School of Meteorology through a variety of social events. With activities ranging from a picnic to kick off the school year for students and faculty, to hot cocoa and Christmas movies to help students decompress during finals week, fun and excitement is never hard to find in the Weather Center. Many students appreciate these opportunities to socialize, especially considering the high percentage of students attending the OU School of Meteorology from out of state, as it gives them a unique and organic forum to connect with peers they otherwise might not come across. A variety of extracurricular opportunities are also available to individuals who participate in SCAN, and to students in the SOM at large. 




The focus of the Chapter is to capitalize on resources in the Western NC region and offer discussions with colleagues who are experts in their field




Education

TAMSCAMS is a student organization bringing together anyone and everyone interested in meteorology and the atmospheric sciences. We have two branches that provide valuable experiences and learning opportunities: The Texas Aggie Storm Chasers (TASC), where you get a first hand experience of severe weather, and Texas A&M Weather Broadcasting, where you can gain actual on-air experience on the radio with forecasting.
