Greetings from the University of California Davis student chapter! We have been busy these last few months, and have undertaken some pretty cool challenges. Most recently, we have elected new chapter officers as: myself as secretary/treasurer, Allison Ellis as vice president, and Kenny Doss as President. This last school year we took on the challenge of trying to photograph the upper atmosphere, (on a college student budget) and did so with great success... Twice throughout the school year, once in Fall, and the other in Spring, we sent a weather balloon carrying a small payload of an assortment of navigation gear as well as a digital camera high into the stratosphere. We used a GPS enabled cell phone in addition to HAM radio navigation to track our balloon, and were graced with a 100% retrieval rate. Our first flight took a track from Napa, California, high up into the coastal mountains, before landing in Knights Landing, Ca in the middle of the central valley. While our second flight launched from Paradise, Ca, which is up in the foothills of the Sierra

Nevada, back down into the valley just north of the Sutter Buttes. We were able to time our spring launch on a day with active convection occurring all around us, and as a result received some absolutely fantastic thunderstorm photos.

This school year finds us planning new and exciting challenges to better ourselves from last year and further push the boundaries of what a student chapter of the AMS can accomplish!
