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
The student chapter of the American Meteorological Society at Western Kentucky University was inaugurated in 2007, with the focus set as a student involvement and outreach organization in conjunction with the meteorology program at WKU. With 38 students currently registered with WKU AMS chapter, our goal is to provide our members with numerous opportunities to get involved in the atmospheric sciences outside of the classroom setting. During the 2010-12 academic years, 40 students presented and/or attended regional and national conferences. Seven awards were given to students who finished in the top three in student research competitions. Two students presented at the annual Severe Weather Workshop in Norman, Oklahoma in 2011. As part of the research presented at these conferences, three undergraduate students have submitted a manuscript to the *Bulletin of the American Meteorological Society (BAMS)*, describing synoptic-scale influences on the historic Mid-South 1-2 May 2010 heavy precipitation event.

This work has been published in the May 2012 issue of *BAMS*. Our chapter works closely with the NWS offices in Louisville, KY and Nashville, TN, by volunteering on a variety of projects and service/outreach needs. Lastly, our members get the opportunity to participate in our nationally recognized "*Field Methods in Weather Analysis & Forecasting*" field course.

In order to financially assist our members with these activities, the WKU AMS chapter organizes numerous fundraising efforts. This includes new t-shirts and weather calendars for sale, a number of food stands, and a dedicated room on campus that serves as a full snack bar for anyone to enjoy. The Department of Geography and Geology has also provided generous stipends to help those who are actively engaged in research, to present their findings at professional meetings.

Edition turns the page to a new chapter in Earth science education

The days of the static science textbook are ending, and a new era utilizing digital and smart technologies is taking hold. The newest edition of AMS Weather Studies has QR codes embedded throughout the book. Unlike QR codes popular in advertising, these codes have been implemented in a way that brings textbooks to life. Students using smart technologies are able to scan these codes accessing figures, satellite image loops and videos demonstrating complex scientific principles that are foundations in meteorology.

Cutting-edge research and recent extreme weather events are included as tools to engage students. The fifth edition by explores the extreme weather events of 2011, such as the southeastern United States tornado outbreaks and extreme flooding associated with Hurricane Irene. Research on recently-identified atmospheric rivers, provides students with access emerging scientific discoveries. Increasing Earth science opportunities at US minority serving colleges and universities

The AMS Education Program is seeking college and university faculty at minority-serving institutions (MSIs) to participate in an expenses paid workshop held in Washington, DC. The fundamentals of climate science and strategies for effectively bringing Earth science into MSIs will be covered. The workshop will be held May 2013, and successful participants will also attend the 2014 AMS Annual Meeting in Atlanta, Georgia.

The 2012 Climate Studies Diversity Program cohort had 30 participants from 16 states and 1 outlying US territory. Activities included trips to lab facilities at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and strategy sessions held at the American Association for the Advancement of Science and Howard University. This is part of National Science Foundation grant #1107968 that will bring AMS Climate Studies to 100 MSIs nationwide.
