Weather Analysis and Forecasting: The Weather Analysis and Forecasting Committee is organizing two exciting, joint conferences: the 27th Conference on Weather Analysis and Forecasting, and the 23rd Conference on Numerical Weather Prediction, to be held in Downtown Chicago from June 29-July 3. Organizers are interested in calling special attention to the communication and use of probabilistic and uncertainty information and the evolving role of the forecaster as our community seeks to include additional decision support services in addition to traditional weather forecasting. The week will also include a panel discussion on NOAA's continued model developments. Other special events to be held during the week will allow attendees to network and socialize: an informal evening activity in downtown Chicago, and a Women's Dinner.
